

# Structure and Spaces with Ann Wheeler

The magic of transforming the commonplace into a treasure is a delightfully satisfying way to create a new textile. You might have already been fascinated by the decorative qualities in a heap of old newspapers or a pile of unironed shirts!

This innovative workshop will enable students to take a fresh look at a variety of everyday throw-away objects and to discover the rhythm and pattern qualities that can convert them into decorative assembled textiles pieces.

Machine stitching, hand lacing and soluble materials will be used to link these fragments, using stitch to link and decorate the fragments. Challenge your idea of how to create a series of innovative textile surfaces from non-traditional materials! You will test several different ways of assembling and make a series of exploratory studies to create an embellished textile from your own magic wand.



Sian Martin is an exhibiting member of the 62 Group and has been involved in making stitched textiles since graduating. Her textiles currently involve stitched and linked paper fragments. Sian has taught art and textiles to all ages and is director of Distant Stitch.

We will begin by layering and combining fabrics and papers, and working into and over the edges of shapes and spaces with colour and hand stitching. As we define shapes, adjust outlines, place accent points and build textures, a variety of subtle and exciting mixed media samples will begin to evolve.

Informed by your own sources of inspiration and Kantha – the embroidered quilts from Bengal – and some contemporary examples, we will then assemble and develop selected samples into personal textile pieces.

Come to enjoy combining together the material qualities of paper, fabric and thread, and to allow the process of working in this way to lead you into creating lovely textile pieces to handle.



Dorothy Tucker has travelled to India. She exhibits her work with the Textile Study Group and with PRISM. She has a particular interest in Kantha, the embroidered quilts from Bengal. She gives talks and workshops, and devises creative textile projects for community groups with Shared Heritage. textilestudygroup.co.uk/members/dorothy-tucker

There are many structures both in nature and manmade that can be described as 'lacelike'. Plant material, skeletonised leaves, branches, lichens and many more examples from the natural world as well as grids, meshes, fencing, scaffolding, and of course lace itself, can all inspire exciting ideas.

We shall use examples of these as starting points to investigate ideas in drawing and mixed media where holes are as important as the 'fabric' created. Having produced a range of developed ideas these can then be used to explore lace like fabrics of differing scales. These can be created with paper or fabrics and stitch, as well as some simple traditional lacemaking techniques used creatively. There will be opportunities to discuss and explore ideas individually as the week progresses.

Be prepared to experiment and question the use of traditional materials.



Ann Wheeler is a free-lance teacher having taught in adult education for over 20 years. She enjoys the process of recording ideas in sketchbooks that can be developed using innovative materials.
